**REMEMBERING STEPHAN KAMBUROV – FROM DR TIM GROUT**

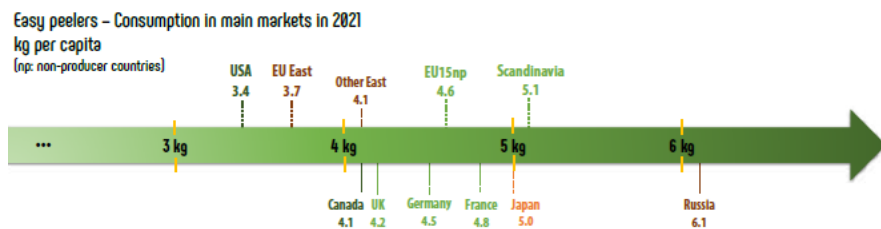
Dr Stephan Kamburov joined the South African Cooperative Citrus Exchange in the mid-1970s as a specialist entomologist. At the time, red scale, a common pest of citrus throughout the country, was developing resistance to the most frequently used insecticides and trees were starting to die in the northern production regions. With experience from Israel, Stephan confidently recommended the use of Orchex mineral oil sprays which saved thousands of trees over the next few years. During the 1980s and early 1990s, Stephan would routinely travel to the northern production areas and meet up with the regional Outspan extension officers to visit farms that required his expertise in resolving pest problems. Stephan would provide very specific recommendations and when next in the area would usually want to visit that farm to see what progress the grower had made. Most growers appreciated his direct approach and implemented his recommendations. By spending considerable time in citrus orchards, Stephan developed a good understanding of what Integrated Pest Management was and how to produce export quality fruit in a sustainable manner. His drive and enthusiasm left an indelible mark on the citrus industry.

**PACKED AND SHIPPED**

This will be the last table for 2022 – future newsletters will unpack the 2022 season for each of the five citrus categories. The final packed for export figure will be just under the 165 million 15Kg carton mark – five million less than anticipated in March, four million up on the 2021 final volume packed for export. Lemons were the only category where the final actual exceeded the original estimate.
